# **Emergency Relief and Support**

## **Emergency evacuation centre training**

- The emergency evacuation centre training is being enhanced and revised to boost the knowledge and confidence of Communities district teams, local government and other partnering agencies to work within an emergency evacuation centre.
- This dynamic, interactive three-hour training enables participants to design and set up an
  evacuation centre, while navigating a variety of scenarios staff may encounter in such
  settings.
- Participants will include a cross section of Communities staff and local government agencies to foster collaboration and relationship building.
- Whenever possible, training will be held in designated evacuation centres to provide hands-on experience.

The ERS team will be in contact to arrange a training schedule and identifying dates and locations.

# **Planning and Preparedness**

 The ERS Directorate are keen to work with Local Governments and partners in preparations and exercising. If you are running any exercises or events that would be of value and appropriate for ERS to attend, please let your ERS Regional Coordinator know.

The ERS Directorate can support the local government by reviewing your emergency kits ensuring that appropriate items and resources are available.

## Update of the Local Emergency Relief and Support Plans (LERSP)

- The ERS Directorate are currently reviewing the Local Emergency Relief and Support Plans (LERSP).
- The LERSP details the operational management and coordination of ERS under the Western Australian (WA) Local Emergency Management Arrangements (LEMAs).
- It is planned to have the LERSP tabled on the agenda for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter LEMC meetings for 2024.

The ERS team will be in contact to request feedback and information to complete the LERSP for your region.

# State-wide audit evacuation centres

• The ERS Directorate is completing audits of the State's nominated evacuation centres.

#### State-wide audit evacuation centres

- The audits are to identify hazard-specific risks relevant to the region and to identify opportunities for local governments to upgrade facilities to mitigate these risks.
- The Directorate would like to engage with local governments (LGs) and WALGA to discuss
  opportunities through the Disaster Ready Fund grants for 2025 to improve these facilities and
  mitigate risks in emergency events.

Discussions are encouraged with your region if you are planning any new evacuations centres or upgrades to existing ones.

# **Recovery Activities Update**

# **Communities 2023/24 High Threat Season Activations**

The ERS Directorate would like to acknowledge and thank all our local and state partners for the assistance and support provided over the 2023-24 season.

Since October 2023, there has been a total of 40 events supported by Communities including:

- Activation under the AUSRECEPLAN

   Israel and Gaza repatriation
- Pre-planning undertaken for 3 high threat weather events, that didn't result in activation.
- 457 people were supported during events through our client management system
- 1 active and declared recovery event (under Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements) -Mariginiup Fire.
- just prior to Christmas 2023, there were 6 activations supported by Communities over just 2 days (20-22 December).

Our team looks forward to working with you all over the coming months as we prepare for the 2024-25 season.

#### **Communities Recovery Activities**

## **Kimberley Floods Recovery Program**

- The Kimberley Flood Recovery Team continues to support impacted residents, through the Hub.
- In addition, to supporting impacted residents with their claims and eligibility requirements is also extended to practical, personal and wellbeing supports.
- At present there are five projects supporting Fitzroy Valley individuals and communities, in varying capacities, and we are reviewing the scope for future project requirements.
- We are currently working with the Housing Team and the Hub, to ensure residents understand their rights and obligations as they begin their journey from their temporary accommodation units to their home.

## **Mariginiup Fires Recovery Program**

- Communities is supporting the City of Wanneroo to deliver the psychosocial wellbeing and financial support elements of the recovery program.
- Communities has engaged several psychologists to support impacted resident referrals and has delivered a financial assistance package aimed at supporting the replacement of essential household items damaged in the fires.
- Communities is currently supporting the City with site visits to damaged properties to commence the clean-up program to ensure residents have access to support services if required.

## **Bunbury Storms Recovery Program**

- As of 15 July, Communities are supporting 9 people in supported accommodation.
- Communities have begun providing return home packages which include food boxes and prepaid cards for individuals transitioning home.
- Communities have finalised psychological services and beginning to triage requests via the approved providers.
- Communities have finalised category 3 and 4 financial assistance and will begin a targeted outreach of known impacted people.
- Communities Disaster Response Hotline remains open for support in the absence of HUBS.
   Communities' officers are engaging regularly with impacted individuals via this hotline.
- Communities is finalising a procurement process with Red Cross for the recovery training program being delivered to the city.

#### **Disaster Ready Fund**

Several LGs in Western Australia (WA) submitted applications for the Disaster Ready Fund (DRF) in 2024 to support the improvement of their facilities used as evacuation centres.

The ERS Directorate had the opportunity to review LGs applications for the Disaster Ready Fund (DRF) provided to the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) for 2024 and assessed that the projects would contribute to the State's ability to provide emergency accommodation for evacuating communities. All applications were considered suitable to progress for further consideration in the DRF process.

# DPIRD's role in emergency management

- ➤ DPIRD is the Hazard Management Agency (HMA) for animal and plant pests and disease incursions. Refer to the <u>State Hazard Plan: Animal and Plant Biosecurity</u> for information on DPIRD's legislated roles and responsibilities.
- ➤ DPIRD is the executor of the State Support Plan for Animal Welfare in Emergencies. This includes livestock, horses, and companion animals. Refer to the <u>State Support Plan: Animal Welfare in Emergencies</u> for information on DPIRD's legislated roles and responsibilities.
- > DPIRD may from time to time provide support to other agencies where requested. This includes administering some components of the <u>Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements WA</u>.

# **National alerts and investigations**

Responses to outbreaks of H7 high pathogenicity avian influenza is currently underway in Victoria, New South Wales, and the ACT. Note that this is not the H5 strain that are currently causing concern globally. DPIRD is monitoring the situation and undertaking preparedness activities. DPIRD is also providing personnel and resources to support jurisdictions with confirmed outbreaks. Poultry producers and owners are encouraged to view our avian influenza page for information on preparedness and detection.

- DPIRD continues to develop their training pathway to build inhouse training capabilities.
- DPIRD's Incident and Emergency Management Branch continues to monitor the Avian Influenza outbreaks in the Eastern States. Preparedness activities have begun including planning with our Animal Biosecurity and Welfare teams, and procurement of necessary equipment as a precaution.

# **Animal Welfare in Emergencies**

DPIRD is the executor of the State Support Plan for Animal Welfare in Emergencies (AWiE). Please note the following important notices regarding AWiE for district and local representatives:

- Local governments are encouraged to have a Plan for Animal Welfare in Emergencies (PAWE) in place. It is an
  important part of all-hazard planning as research has shown that animals will influence people's decision-making and
  behaviour during emergencies. Refer to the <u>animal welfare</u> section of our website for resources, support, and contacts. Local
  governments can reach out to our Incident and Emergency Management Branch if they require advice and support for the
  development of their PAWE (contact <u>iemb@dpird.wa.gov.au</u>).
- DPIRD's Incident and Emergency Management Branch is undertaking preparedness and response activities where activated under the <a href="State Support Plan Animal Welfare in Emergencies">State Support Plan Animal Welfare in Emergencies</a>.






# Wagin LEMC Report - 2 Oct 2024

# **BUSHFIRE SEASON OUTLOOK & PREPARATION**



The region is unseasonally dry with significant rainfall not occurring till later in the season, currently ahead of 5 year average with forecast warmer than average temps and average to below average rainfall Oct- Dec 2024

# **Key Preparedness Measures and Messages**

Three areas of focus we have as an agency in preparation:

**Safety** – There was a tragic incident resulting in loss of life in Esperance and in our own region several injuries last season. The importance of regular high quality training, suitable PPE and safe operational practise to keep all responders safe is significant. The release of online Rural Fire Awareness for Farmer Response has been helpful in preparing seasonal farm workers,

- Communication Timely and accurate information from reporting all fires to 000 and good information within the first 15 minutes then every hour there after are key to making sure we have the resources to suppress the incidents in a timely manner (see attached PAFTACS sheet). To that end we will be running pre-season briefings in October. <a href="https://www.emergency.wa.gov.au/">https://www.emergency.wa.gov.au/</a> continues to be a reliable source of truth and information.
- **Risk Mitigation**: Good preparation for the impending season is key and we are:
  - Through our Bushfire Risk Mitigation Co-ordinator, Blake, managing our UCL and UMR parcels within the gazetted town boundaries.
  - Reviewing risk and deploying SOSF High Season vehicles where incident numbers, risk, training and engagement are suitable for suppression resources
  - Continuing the Grain Harvest Strategy of forward basing fixed wing aircraft in Narrogin over the Harvest period.
  - o Engaging stakeholders around testing their plans and preparedness activities.



#### **Australian Warning System (AWS)**

As of 15 July 2024, Western Australia has adopted the Australian Warning System (AWS) for bushfire, cyclone, flood and storm warnings.

The AWS is a national approach to emergency information that aims to deliver consistent warnings to Australian communities, so people know what they need to do to stay safe in an emergency, no matter where they are.

Consistent warning levels, colours and hazard icons supported by a clear and concise action statement will make warnings easier to understand.

Attached is a gazetted map of the <u>Wagin VFRS Fire District</u>. The VFRS are responsible for fire in that area, outside of that space they can be requested. Like at the Macco Feeds fire earlier in the year requesting additional capability early is easily done. A Section 13 to transfer control of the incident can be done at the request of a Local Government but this takes time to be approved and implemented and is not instant.

# **Health and Safety Representative Tip**

# Person Conducting a Business or Undertaking Primary Duty of Care

The Work Health and Safety Act 2020 (WA) describes the Primary Duty of Care held by a person conducting a business or undertaking (PCBU).

A PCBU must ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable the health and safety of:

- workers engaged, or caused to be engaged by the person
- workers whose activities in carrying out work are influenced or directed by the person

A PCBU must ensure, so far as reasonably practicable, that the health and safety of others is not put at risk from work carried out as part of the conduct of the business or undertaking

A PCBU must also ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable:

- the provision and maintenance of a work environment without risks to health and safety
- the provision and maintenance of safe plant and structures
- the provision and maintenance of safe systems of work
- the safe use, handling and storage of plant, structures and substances
- the provision of adequate facilities for the welfare of workers in carrying out work, including ensuring access to the facilities
- the provision of any information, training, instruction or supervision that is necessary to protect all persons from risks to health and safety from work carried out
- the health of workers and the workplace conditions are monitored to prevent illness or injury of workers arising from the conduct of the business or undertaking








# **Learning Tips**
